PTE Core: A Case Study

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What is PTE Core?

PTE Core is a **computer-based language test** that measures **everyday English skills** through a range of day-to-day life and work-based tasks.

PTE Core provides secure proof of a person's everyday English skills for work and migration purposes.

PTE Core: The Design



A general 4-skills English test



Content includes everyday life and workplace scenarios



A test that is focused on non-academic use of English



Accepted by the Canadian government (IRCC) for all work and migration visas.



How does PTE Core compare?

PTE Core

PTE Core tests **general English** through tasks related to every day life and workplace scenarios.

PTE Academic

PTE Academic tests **academic English** with tasks related to study and professional skills.

Skills assessed

4 skills: speaking, writing, reading and listening. Integrated skills testing.

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Test content

General content relevant to every day life, workplaces and some study situations (non-academic). Content covers subjects that would be familiar to everyone.

Authentic source content such as videos/podcasts on the internet, announcements, automated telephone helplines, work meetings, and broadcasts.

Academic content relevant to study and professional situations such as university lectures, interviews, and academic articles.

Authentic source content such as reading and audio texts from books and articles covering broad topics such as social sciences, humanities, business, technology, and health & medicine.





LIFE CYCLE OF AN APPLE TREE






Most libraries have activities for children, such as storytelling, reading programs, and crafts. Libraries may also offer workshops and lectures for adults.

PTE Core:

Establishing Alignment to the CLB and Verification



We used established Standard Setting methodologies: Using:

- A panel of 14 independent judges
- A familiarisation process
- 4 separate activities- one for each language skill
- An item—centred modified Angoff method was used for receptive skills
- A test-taker modified Analytic judgement method was used for productive skills



Training, Familiarisation and Standardization This phase was required:

- To familiarize judges with the standard setting procedures
- To familiarize judges with the PTE Core test purpose and structure, with particular emphasis on the item types used in the standard setting activities
- To standardize judges' understanding of CLB proficiency levels
- To provide judges practice in applying CLB descriptors to exemplar items and performances.



The Receptive Skill Modified Angoff Method

Item centred for listening and reading items:

Judges were asked to identify which CLB level a test taker would need to be in order for the probability of success to be 50% for each item

This concept can be difficult to conceptualise and so a large part of the training was given to discuss this concept and develop a group understanding and application



The Productive Skill Modified Angoff Method

Test-taker centred approach for Speaking and writing skills

- Speaking and Writing skills considered separately
- Judges were asked to make holistic judgements of a test taker's CLB level based on the longer writing and speaking items from the Field Test

Data Cleaning and Analysis

Following Round 2, the data were prepared for analysis. Drawing on prior PTE and CLB alignment research, three criteria were applied to clean the data (Jones et al., 2017).

- Remove any ratings more than 1.5 levels from the average rating for an item. A total of 5.54% of ratings were removed.
- Remove any judges whose correlation with the average of all judges is less than 0.5. No judges had correlations below 0.50, so no judges were removed.
- Remove any **items** with low certainty. Items are considered to have low certainty when the maximum proportion of judges rating in any two adjacent categories is less than 70%. A total of 3.75% of items were removed.

Verification and next steps

- The PTE Core- CLB Alignments, based on Field Test data were verified in a separate activity in July 2022
- This alignment will undergo further verification once a large and representative data-set on the live operational test becomes available
